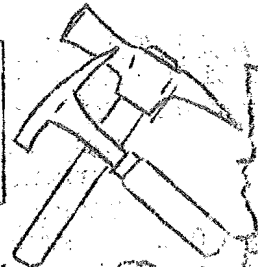

EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES JULY 15 - VIRGINIA OWENS

Meeting called to order at 8 P. M. by President Aileen Bergersen at her home.

MSC/ Del Jones/George Warren, III, that reading of past minutes be dispensed with in order to give more time to Mr. Burke, who was present to clarify our present insurance coverage. Our insurance covers damage to property owner. He stressed the point that we as individuals should have proper coverage for ourselves in case of personal injury. He clarified that the same coverage would apply to any guest of the Club and that they expect that there will be guests from time to time. Due to Mr. Engbeck's recent illness (he took care of the insurance in the past), Shop coverage had lapsed. Included in the coverage in addition to fire and theft, any visitor or guest in the Shop would be covered in case of accident. Mr. Burke will inspect our Shop and advise of necessary increase and proper coverage. MSC/ Loren Dowell/Phil Clarke that our present coverage be increased in line with the many improvements in our Shop. The Ohio Casualty Insurance Co. carries our policy and Mr. Burke informed us that we have an excellent record.

Treas: Ed Peters reported as follows: Bal. May 31, 1966 \$1,612.78; Income \$409.56, Bal. \$2,022.44; Disbursements: \$360.01, Bal. \$1,662.43.

MSC/ Ben Owens/Del Jones that bills be paid.

Librarian Viola Cutter announced special binders for magazines have been ordered, Sinkankas' book on Gen. Cutting is to be ordered as Joe Engbeck's memorial book. Viola would like her box for return books. MSC/ Loren Dowell/Ben Owens that Mineral Information Bulletin from the Bureau of Mines be ordered for the Library.

Consideration is being given to applying for reduced rates in mailing for the Club. As a non-profit organization, we can qualify. MSC/ Loren Dowell/Ben Owens that we get the ball rolling.

A recommendation was made by Jean Pfefer and Louise Palmer that one individual be appointed to be responsible for getting together a Club Case representative of all phases for our Society. MSC/ Loren Dowell/Del Jones that this be done.

Show Committee will select dealers for next year's Show.

Jean Pfefer, Membership Chairman, announces DUES ARE DUE. \$6.00 for family, \$4.00 for Single Membership, and \$1.25 for a Junior.

Phil Clarke announced that they are having a problem getting the sanding discs to adhere to the present backing. Several suggestions were offered.

Joe Engbeck, Jr. has donated the flat lap in the Shop to the Society. This was one of the first items loaned to the Shop when it originally opened.

MSC/ Del Jones/Joe Knights that Open House date be included in the program at Show Time, to be hold some time shortly after the Show. Suggestion made by Jean Pfefer.

The Club's Desert John has arrived and Phil Clarke has already made the necessary measurements for an additional one.

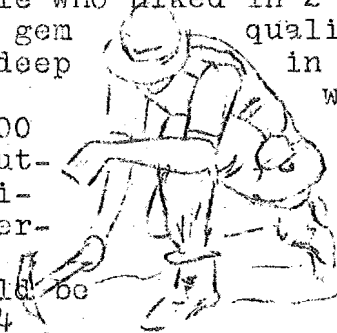

PLACE: Anderson Dam (Note: Lake has been drained so diggins are good this time of year.)

MATERIALS TO BE COLLECTED: Agate, Magnesite in agate, nodules and magnesite.

MEETING PLACE: Sunday 8:30 A.M. on the paved boat ramp just beyond Dam. Lots of parking. George Warren, III will be in charge and will meet you there to point out 3 digging areas.

ROUTE OF TRAVEL: Approx 52 mi. (1 1/2 hrs.) from San Lorenzo by Freeway. Take Rt. #17 to San Jose and turn South on Rt. #101. Just before entering Morgan Hill, turn left on Cochran Rd. at the Capri Restaurant (open 7 A.M. if you wish breakfast). Drive right up and over the Dam.

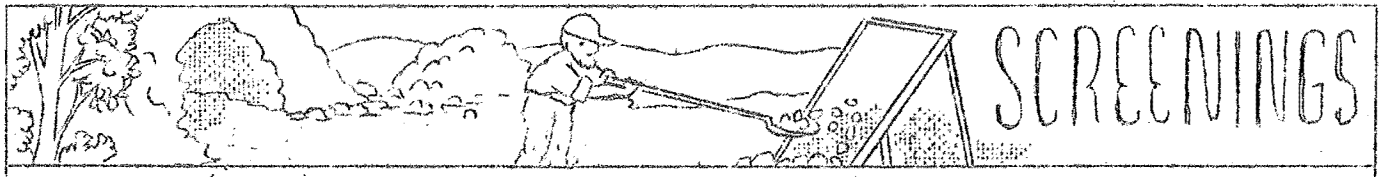
EQUIPMENT: Rock hammer, pick, shovel, rock bag, sledge, canteen of water, straw hat, lunch.

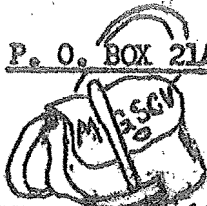

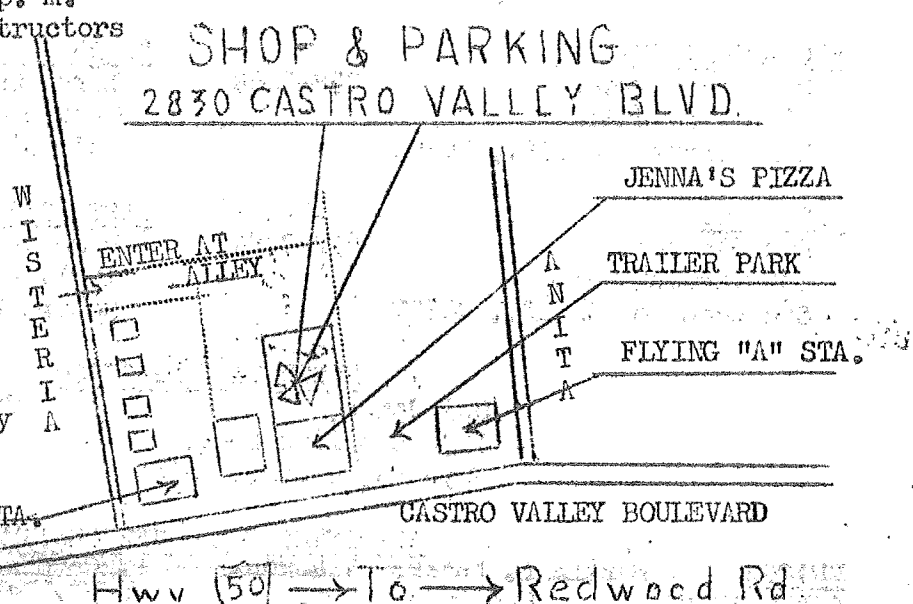
