A Teaching Summer

I spent my summer beginning mid-June thru the month of July, teaching lost wax classes on Sundays. The first part of our class involves learning to make a pendant setting for a cab made at the shop. We learned to make bezels, bails, how to weigh the wax, and weigh the silver, mount the wax pick out a cylinder and put tape on it with their name and weight in silver. They also learned to always use 30% new granules with each casting and what will happen if you don't.

The second class we learned to anneal the pieces, pickle and clean them, and cut off the button and prepare it for finish work. I take the pieces home and put them in a tumbling vibrator with stainless needle shot, and this cleans the pieces perfectly. In the afternoon we learned to shoot wax into the rubber molds that the shop has upstairs. Each class lasted about 6 hours.

I took a break from wax classes in August. Wire wrap class is still on Monday nights but new students need to sign up.



Petrified Forest Calistoga, CA

Some are as much as 8' in diameter by 65' long, and they are all laying in the same direction knocked down by a volcanic eruption about 3 million years ago near Mt. St. Helena.

The gift shop there was a real surprise; full of gems, minerals and petrified wood for sale. After walking around the shop several times I asked an employee who did their lapidary work, and of course I proudly mentioned our club. The next thing I knew she was discounting our items, and took us into the back room to see more items. She offered to let me buy anything I saw in several buckets of unfinished wood slabs from the property and of course I sure did. She was so nice to us that it really made our visit special. The admission fee into the Petrified Forest was "on us" she said too. Wow! What a great experience it was. We feel that being part of the Rockhound community is always that, a great experience.
