Education: Diana Cohoon says the silver smithing class with **Lee Chavez** did some great bracelets. There will be another class in October. It is filling up fast.


Announcements: Charles Minshall passed away. Everyone who attended the memorial said they learned something new about Charles. Did you know he raced motorcycles and stock cars?

BRAD SMITH BENCH TIPS

LITTLE BALLS

I often use little balls, silver and gold, as accent pieces on my designs. They can be made as needed from pieces of scrap. Just put the scrap on a solder pad and melt it with a torch. Then throw the balls into a small cup of pickle.

The only problem is if you need to make all the balls the same size, for that you need the same amount of metal to melt each time, and the only way I know to do that is to clip equal lengths of wire but there's an easier way to get a supply of well-formed balls. Simply pick them out of your stash of casting grain. Before you grab for your magnifying glass and tweezers, you may want to do what I do, just pour the casting grain out onto a baking pan, tilt the pan a bit and watch all the round ones roll to the bottom. Then pick out the good ones and pour the rest back into your bag for casting.

SHAPING A BENCH PIN

What does your bench pin look like? New ones need some modification

To best support the work you do. My feeling is that a bench pin that's not drilled with holes, marked with gouges, or sawed at odd angles is just not working for you.

Take a look at this short video from the GIA (via BenchTubes at Ganoksin.com) that shows some changes to a standard bench pin that makes it efficient for stone setting. It may give you some ideas about changes you could make to your own pin that would let you do your work faster and avoid mistakes that waste time and effort.

RAISING A CABOCHON

When a cabochon sits too low in a bezel, the bezel hides a lot of the stone. Solution is to either sand down the bezel height or boost up the stone. Question is what do you use to elevate your cab?

I was taught to use fine sawdust but now think that there's a better solution, especially for use in rings. I reason that rings will frequently get wet, which would cause the sawdust to swell in size and push the stone against the bezel. Then when the sawdust dries out, the stone would be a little loose. In any case, I now prefer pieces of plastic sheet to boost up my stones. Pieces are readily available from product packaging or from old credit cards. I just

cut a piece to loosely fit the bezel and drop in the stone (with some dental floss) to check its height.

TIP FOR A TRANSPARENT CAB

When bezel setting a transparent cabochon in silver, I worry that the silver will tarnish under the stone and will destroy the brilliance of its color & pattern. So I take one extra step before setting the stone. I place a piece of thin silver Mylar plastic under the stone to act as a mirror that will never tarnish. This Mylar is readily available in craft and gift wrap stores, or in a pinch from a party balloon supplier. You may want to experiment with using colored or patterned Mylar (i.e. diffraction pattern) under some stones.

KIDS KORNER

Lost Wax by Elizabeth Bennette

When I was first introduced to lost wax, I was overwhelmed, because the process was so foreign, and the pieces that other members had made were quite good. "For starters, how am I even supposed to make this?" I would think to myself. "I know I have to use wax to make my first mold... I think? ...And then what do I do?" And not only did the process baffle me, but when I looked at the different pieces that the more experienced members made, I thought I would never be able to make something that detailed. Some of the pieces they made blew my mind. The amount

of precision used to create something as intricate as a leaf, or an animal that was only about an inch wide was incredible, and I knew that creating something like that would take years of experience. So when I started with my first piece, I was nervous. I thought I wouldn't be able to make a presentable piece because the process was too confusing, and that whatever I would do would not look good because of my lack of knowledge and experience. But when Diana, my instructor, walked me through the process, it was easy to forget my worries. I was able to make my pendant, the first piece that I decided to make, one step at a time. She walked me through the first few steps slowly, so I could understand what to do, and how to do it. After a while, it seemed so much easier to me, and a lot less complicated. Processes like grinding down bumps on my pendant or getting the final, perfect polish wasn't as menacing as I'd originally thought, because I knew exactly which tools to use and how to use them. As I put more effort into my piece, I became more aware of how much I enjoyed the process and how it came easier to me than I thought it would. And the entire time, I was getting great support from the other members. They'd give me tips, like what type of materials to buy that would help me be more proficient, or what angle to hold my grinder, and cheer me on. I got really comfortable with both the people and the process. With the tips and words of encouragement I received, I knew that even though lost wax seemed hard at first, it really wasn't if you have the right type of support. Whether it's your teachers or your

peers, friendly advice can really make you feel more confident about what you do, and who you are. I realized that my fear of being judged based on my work was ridiculous because when I'm at the Mineral and Gem Society, I feel as if I'm a part of a family, and that everyone is only here to help you be your best.

1....that coral reefs are the largest structures ever built on planet Earth by any animal, including man.


