Program: What is Available at the Shop by **Beth Farmer**

There are several tools available in the bottom row of lockers or in the jeweler's bench in the fabrication area. Metal Working Tools include mallets, ball peen hammer, bracelet mandrels, ring sizing sticks, stakes, paraffin wax, doming blocks, punch set, pliers, tin snips, bezel rockers, dapping block, wire work forms, hand stamps, brushes, soldering picks and more. There is a soldering machine with an instruction book and parts for use. Wax Working Tools include micrometer, magnifying lens, parallel sided ring mandrels and an extensive rubber mold library upstairs in the cabinet on the right. There is a machine to make your own rubber molds and rubber for purchase also. Stone Working Tools include easy mount gem pliers, spool polisher and large flat laps in the polishing room. The large flat laps need to be cleaned in the sink near the refrigerator and then put it away after they are dry. The faceting machine in the polishing room is for intarsia projects. There are many things available that you may not be aware of that the club owns to help you in your lapidary art.

KIDS KORNER

When you first hear the word "fossil" what do you think? Most members would probably imagine a fossilized piece of wood. In the shop, we often incorporate fossils into our pieces, and I have seen some fantastic work, beautiful cabs, carvings, and polished slabs, which all make use of fossils in a variety of creative ways. But, members have yet to learn what nature already knows: how to create opalized fossils.

These fantastic gems are created when crevices or holes are filled with water and a solution of Silicon dioxide (silica). Once the water and silica harden, the shape of the cast is shown by the opal. Though none of the original fossils' records are kept, the beautiful opal takes it's place. Similar to lost wax, opal can take the shape of the original object, which deteriorates before the water and scilica fill the opening. Some of the most popular of opalized stones are

ones found in Australia. An opal centre in Lightning Ridge, New South Wales, has a wide collection of opalized fossils from dinosaur teeth to shells. The opalized pineapple and squid which are featured on their website are my favorites.

The most fantastic of all the fossils I've seen are the ammonites. Ammonites. mollusk fossils with spiral shells, are commonly revered for the intricate patterns on their polished insides. But, the opal ammonites are most beautiful on the outside. (You may have seen some samples of regular ammonites at a dealer's booth at the annual show!) The detailed impressions from the opal-ammonites are present because the ammonite does not completely deteriorate before the water-scilica solution hardens around it. This leaves the shell with a casing of opal and a beautiful sheen, making some of the most stunning fossils look even better. Even though fossils are already well-known and enjoyed throughout our community, opalized fossils are even more special.




