#### BRAD SMITH BENCH TIPS



#### FOREDOM MAINTENANCE

If you have a Foredom flexshaft, it makes sense to check it over every so often

to be sure it's running properly. But how to do that? You've probably lost the little booklet that came with the unit. Well, being the good company it is, Foredom has put together an extensive set of videos on how to do it.

The series covers set-up, lubrication, replacing a sheath, motor maintenance, and handpiece maintenance. Few if any special tools are needed. You can watch the videos at www.foredom.net/videolibrary.aspx and repair parts are available from most jewelry supply catalogs.

#### JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy bench items for putting a drop of oil or glue just where you want it.

The small metal tubing lets you squeeze out very small drops and reach into tight places. I use the small one on the left for oil when I'm sawing or drilling harder metals like steel. And I use the bottle on the right from a plastics store for the fast drying glues used to join pieces of acrylic.

#### KIDS KORNER

Since 1848, when James Marshall found gold in the America River and started what would eventually be known as the Gold Rush of 1849, California has historically been known as a gold mining state. But, in the past few decades, there really hasn't been much gold mining done in the Golden State. The main reason for this is because of the low prices paid for gold during the 1980-90's. During that time, the price of gold did not exceed \$500/oz at any point, making the gold business unattractive. However, gold prices have begun moving upwards, reaching almost \$1,800 an ounce. These dramatic gains in the value of gold have created a second gold rush in California.

Sutter Mining company, one of the new generation of gold mining companies, recently reopened a gold mine in Amador Valley's "mother lode" where 7.5 million ounces of gold were once mined in the 3.6 mile area. The company will begin mining in the heart of the mother lode using new technology such as explosives equipped with electronic detonators. These explosives are safer and more effective than traditional mining methods allowing the company to process 30% more gold. Sutter expects their new operation to bring in 650,000 oz of gold worth more than \$1 billion.

While companies like Sutter are introducing new tools to mine larger amounts of gold, they still have to deal with the legacy of prior generations of gold miners. For decades, prospectors have used toxic chemicals such as mercury and cyanide to break down the rock covering the gold in their mines. After the miners took out the last nuggets from their claims, they left behind an environmental hazard. Modern gold mining companies who have bought the rights to these old mines are now forced by the government to cleanup the toxic mess left by the previous owners before they can begin extracting gold. These companies have had success with cleaning

the mines by turning the solidified toxic waste into tile and filtering the water found in the old mines and returning it to local creeks or lakes. Though this new generation of prospectors faces some obstacles, new technology is allowing them to go forward in an environmentally positive and profitable way.

#### SAFETY RULES FOR POLISHING

- I. Tie back loose clothing and hair.
- 2. Wear protective goggles
- 3. Do not wear gloves. They can get caught in the machinery.
- 4. Do not surprise or interrupt a person using polishing machinery.
- 5. Check to see if all guards are in place before you start.
- 6. If an article gets caught in the buff, turn off the machine IMMEDIATLY. Stand back and wait for the machine to stop before you attempt to retrieve your piece.
- 7. Never stop the machine by hand




