GEM OF THE MONTH

VINTAGE GEM OF THE MONTH FIRST PRINTED IN 1999

Our gem this month remember a trip she took with her mom and dad. Her dad went off fishing and she and her mother were close to the water when she spotted a pretty rock--yellows and oranges and brown. It was about 2 inches by two inches and she asked her mother if she could take it home. That seemed like a harmless request so they started to pick it up but they had no tools so they pushed rocks around and slowly tried to dig it out. Her dad showed up after awhile and they asked him to get it out. He started to dig and couldn't believe it. The rock just seemed to keep on growing. Eventually he got it out and it weighed about 100 pounds. And it sits proudly in their front yard. Her dad managed to saw off a piece years later when he became a member of the MGSCV and it was identified as a jasper.

Our gem was born in Oakland and graduated from Hayward High School. Her family liked to camp and she liked keeping those "pretty" rocks. A cousin belonged to our society and told them about our field trips, so in 1967 they joined. Black Rock Desert. Hallelujah Junction, and some of the places in Arizona were some of the field trip sites. Obsidian is her favorite stone and she has many specimens from Davis Creek. Although just collecting rocks was enough for her, her dad got the bug when he bought an 18 inch saw. From then on he made cabs winning many prizes including one from a national award in Seattle in 1971. Her dad also started an

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educational case which she modifies and displays in many shows.(she has won many awards, also, locally and at Federation shows.) Now her favorite stone is Chrysoprase. Today she is a bus driver and has also been an electronic assembler.

She was a foster child who was adopted by her parents **Betty** and **Blue Andrade** who took her in at age three months. So now you know our gem-- **Bonnie Andrade**. Both her parents are deceased. She eventually connected with her birth mother who had kept track of her through the years. It was a happy reunion and they spend much time together. But she still remembers her adoptive parents.

Bonnie was elected vice president a few years ago. She was quite concerned she couldn't do it but the officers said they would help her. And, of course, veteran members remember what happened. Our President **Bill Collins** died and **Bonnie** immediately was thrust into the job of leadership. With the help of the membership she made it. And now she is coming through again.

BRAD SMITH BENCH TIPS



MOBILE STAND

A handy mobile stand for your flexshaft can be made easily and quickly from the base of an old swivel office chair. You can find these chairs being thrown out at office buildings and schools. I just ask the custodian in my building to set one aside for me.

To separate the chair from the wheeled base, simply remove the spring clip from the center bottom. I use a small screwdriver or a pair of pliers.

To make the stand, you'll need two pieces of threaded galvanized steel pipe and a pipe fitting from a hardware store. The first length of pipe is 3/4 inch diameter to fit the hole in most chair bases. The second piece is a length of less expensive 1/2 inch pipe. Total length of the two pipes should be five feet. I used a two foot length of 3/4 pipe and a three foot length of 1/2 pipe. They are joined together by a pipe fitting called a 3/4 to 1/2 reducing coupler.

LOCAL METALS SOURCE

Local sheet metal shops typically have barrels of scrap copper, brass and aluminum sheet that they save for recycling. Shops will usually let you go through the barrels to select the shapes and thicknesses you want. Prices vary but will generally be just a little more than the wholesale per-pound scrap value.

I've found it's much cheaper to buy metal this way than ordering from a catalog. There are no shipping charges, and you'll be supporting a local small

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business in your community. Do remember to bring your thickness gauge and work gloves if you try this.

KIDS KORNER

Earlier this month while studying for my AP European History French Revolution exam, I came across a stone whose history I wanted to share: the Hope Diamond. My history textbook detailed how the diamond was stolen from the king's treasury during the French Revolution. Known for its beautiful blue hue and size, the 112 3/16-carat diamond is also infamous for its fatal history. After reading my textbook's short description of the diamond, I decided to dig a bit deeper and sought out more information. Records from the Smithsonian Encyclopedia indicate that during the mid 1600s, the uncut Hope Diamond was stolen from an Indian mine, and the thief sold the gem to King Louis XIV. Soon after the sale, this same thief was mauled to death by dogs while in Russia. The thief's violent end would become the first in a string of misfortune that would befall anyone who possessed the diamond. In 1673, King Louis XIV had the stone cut into its current 67 1/8-carat shape, and placed it into a ceremonial gold setting, and from then on, it was known as a crown jewel. After the French Revolution, the Hope Diamond was stolen from the French treasury. The stone

would later resurface and come into the possession of King George IV of England. The British King died in 1830, but only after suffering from dementia for the last 20 years of his life. Because of his lavish lifestyle, King George was forced into debt, and after his death, the Hope Diamond was sold off. The next owner of the diamond was Henry Philip Hope, whose last name was given to the diamond. Eventually his nephew Henry Thomas Hope inherited the stone. Although Henry Thomas Hope and his uncle died normal deaths, the curse of the stone still affected them. The once prosperous Hope family was sent into bankruptcy soon after the younger Henry Hope inherited the stone and the Hope Diamond was sold in order to pay off debts. The next owner of the diamond was Mrs. Evalyn Walsh McLean, who lived in Washington DC in the early 1900's. Mrs. McLean had the stone reset into its pendant mounting. After purchasing it, Mrs. McLean wore it constantly at her various parties that she hosted, causing her to become known as "the woman with the blue diamond." While the famous socialite did not experience an unusual death, many of her family members seemed to fall victim to the curse of the diamond. Her nine year old son died as a result of a car accident, her first child committed suicide at the age of 25, and her husband died in a mental institution shortly after being declared insane. After Mrs. McLean's death ten years later, the necklace was donated to the Smithsonian Museum, where it is still on display. Though the diamond's curse did impact all of its

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owners in an unfortunate way, its beauty and colorful history made it all the more desirable.

The tale of the diamond serves as a prime example of a gem whose beauty and mysterious history led it to become one of the most legendary and sought after stones of the millennia. Influential figures like King Louis XIV and McLean shared a passion for the stone and let it define them. The Hope Diamond wasn't only a crown jewel, but a symbol of pride, sacrifice, and honor for all of its owners. This serves to show that the love of jewelry has lived for centuries, and that the pieces we make have the possibility to have an amazing story, and touch the lives of hundreds.

FLUORESCENT ROCKS

(continued)

A portion of the extensive Fluorescent Rock Collection of **Harry Wain** was donated to the Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley (MGSCV) by his daughter **Ruth Morgan Wain** in 2009. This acquisition was facilitated by **Mark Isaacs**, the dual Fluorescent Mineral Society (FMS) and MGSCV member who organizes the annual fluorescent display for our club's show. Mark's article describing the acquisition of Mr. Wain's collection can be found in the November 2009 Petrograph.

During our upcoming annual show (February 21, 22 & 23, 2014) the Fluorescent Hall will contain some of the **Harry Wain** collection. The Fluorescent Hall is located in the building on the left

side of the central patio at the Newark Pavilion (entrance underneath the large sign). The room is lit only by the UV lights shining on the brilliantly technicolored rocks in their exhibit cases and on the dealer tables. The rocks are clearly labeled with the type of rock and location mined.

Fluorescent rocks can be found all over the world. The Fluorescent Minerals of Franklin, New Jersey play a prominent role in the collection to be seen. Some of the minerals included are Apatite, Aragonite, Axinite, Barite, Barylite, Calcite (the most common fluorescent mineral of Franklin and Ogdensburg), Esperite, Clinohedrite, Corundum, Diposide, Fluorite, Hardystonite, Hydrozincite, Manganapatite, Margarosanite, Norbergite, Pectolite, Phlogopite, Sphalerite, Svabite, Tremolite, Willemite (the brightest fluorescent mineral of Franklin), Wollastonite (one of the most prized of the Franklin Fluorite minerals). Wollastonite is rare and brilliantly fluorescent, but the daylight color is gray or white.

Mr. Wain founded the Mineral Equipment Company in 1959 to manufacture ultraviolet lamps suited for field prospecting and displaying fluorescent minerals. His company became Raytech Industries. 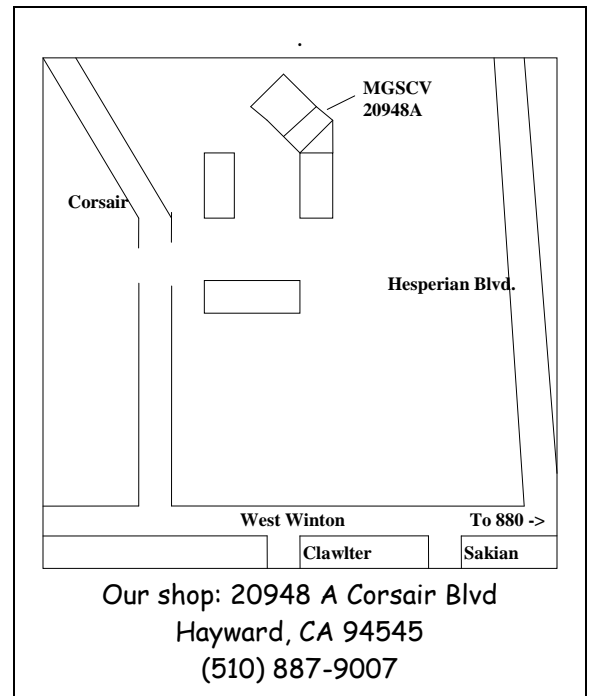

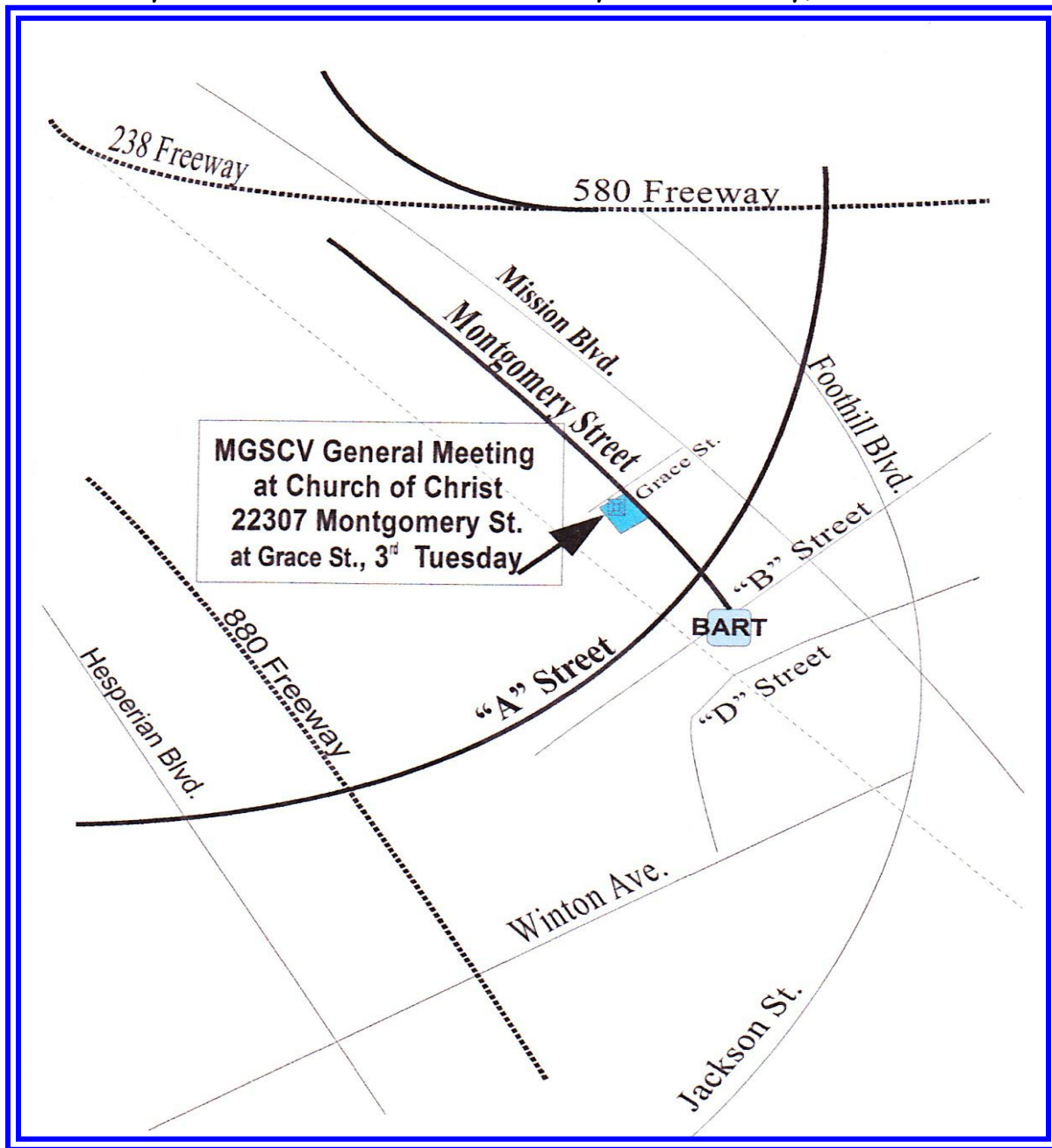
