There is no other club known to have corporate sponsorship. We would need to be 501c3 so they can donate and get a write off on their taxes. There was a discussion on walk-in traffic and the procedures needed to implement this for 501c3 compliance.

Does society equipment go to the CFMS if it closes its doors? It depends on what our bylaws say and we can change it to what we want.

Event insurance form needed for 2016. The website still has the 2015 application and the underwriter hasn't sent the current form.

Do we have legal representation? Yes, see CFMS website and look up legal advisor.

How do we get the 50 year award? We were incorporated in 1948 according to the articles of incorporation with the CFMS. Our certificate is coming. In the meantime we have a hand written one on hotel stationary signed the CFMS president.


Membership Money Drawing: The name drawn tonight for \$100 is Lawrence Keyte unfortunately he is not present. At the next meeting the amount goes to \$105

DEPTH GAUGE FOR DRILLING

Sometimes you need to drill a number of holes all to the same depth. One quick and easy way to do this is to wind some tape around the drill bit so that the tape just touches the part surface when the hole is deep enough.

You can set the depth either by measuring from the tip of the drill to the tape or by drilling to the correct depth, leaving the bit in the hole, and wrapping tape around the bit at the surface level.

Note that a little extra tape left free on the end will blow away debris from the drilling.



CUTTING A BOLT

Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to restore any distorted threads. The problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.

First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the

end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt.

Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.

SHOP TUTORIAL

Hello 2016 MGSCV members!

This month's shop tutorial will focus on metal fabrication.

Ganoskin is a website for metal workers. Check it out!

This week's tip is to use colored permanent markers on both sides of your sheet solder, prior to cutting pallions. Think red for hard, blue for medium, black for easy. Then when those pesky pallions jump away while cutting and fly somewhere else than your preferred storage spot, you can sort by color and be assured that a medium pallion is going to melt when medium is supposed to.

There is a locker holding tools every metal fabricator needs in the lower left

location you are welcomed to use in the shop.

You should also check out the wooden desk to the right of fab table. There are tools and stuff you might need, and a cool anvil for fabbing rings, bracelets and flatware sitting on top.

Poke around the shelf over the fab work surface. Binding wire, different sized torch tips, yellow ochre, lots of stuff you can use are stored there. Just please don't drop anything in the pickle pot from above!

Use the shear on the workbench behind you for gold, copper or silver only! No steel or hard materials please!

Remember to close the soldering liquids available for your use after working on your project, clean up any pins, scrap or binding wire left behind after your work. Please turn off the tank valve.

We do have some polishing equipment behind the trim saw area for your use. Never polish metal on the soft Genie wheels! These motors spin very fast, please ask someone who you knows about this polishing gear give you a safety checkout before your first use. And please, clean up after yourself!

Good luck on your project! Do not hesitate to pass on any suggestions that may make members work more safely and successfully to the Shop Supervisor or Shop Manager.





KIDS KORNER

Keeping Up with the Mineral and Gems By Elizabeth Bennette, 17 years old

In a high school student's average experience, senior year is notorious for being one of the most hectic and stressful. With weekends filled with college preparations, and evenings consisting of studying and extracurricular, it's easy to lose connection with your hobbies and interests. I personally experienced this loss just recently, as I haven't been able to keep myself involved in the mineral and gem community as I had since I was in elementary school. Anxious to jump back into the world of minerals and gems, I looked for a way to get involved at my high school. Although not many student clubs offered the same level of professionalism and craft as the club. I was able to find something similar in the geology class offered through the high school's science department. Confident that my experience with MGSCV would contribute to my enjoyment of the course, I enthusiastically enrolled, excited to put what I had learned to use, and to open myself up to learning even more.

After completing the first of two semesters of the course, I am happy to say that it has been a wonderful experience. We kicked off the year with some basic lessons about geological map usage, the atomic structure of rocks, and rock classification. Through a combination of inclass lectures and group lab assignments, we had the opportunity to get both a practical and theoretical approach to rock studies, and even had the chance to do some classifying of our own. Personally, I found the early stages of the classifying activities to be relatively simple, as I had been exposed to rocks from an early age, and was familiar with the names and indications. Stones like quartz and obsidian were easy to identify after attending our annual shows and seeing them in the display cases at the shop. Quartz characteristics uneven breakage surfaces and clarity was one I had recognized almost immediately, as one of the first stones that I had ever cabbed was a type of rutilated quartz.

Seeing this continuation of my gem and mineral experience had made me proud of my work, and led me to understand the true value of my time there. Later in that chapter, I got the opportunity to learn more about the formation of the rocks, which was aided by the research I had conducted to write articles for the petrograph. A year or two ago, I had written an article about the formation of opals and another on diamonds, two concepts that were central to the curriculum of that chapter. I was able to get even more in depth about the chemistry behind rock formation in my geology class.

We discussed the atomic bonding that occurs as pressure is applied to specific chemical compounds under the Earth's surface. This bonding is what gives rocks their characteristic hardness, texture, and density that we use to identify them in the shop. When writing those articles a few years ago, I had a difficult time comprehending those complicated processes, and instead, used those vague understandings to bolster my understanding of gems and minerals. But after these particular lessons, I've been able to develop my knowledge about a topic that I was passionate about, and even ended up doing well on that chapter's assessment!

It's easy to lose track of your hobbies and interests, but impossible for forget your passions. Whether it is art, music, or geology, I encourage everyone to stay involved with what they love, in any way they can. I look forward to my second semester of geology, and to learning even more!

Another has gone by and our young people are getting older and so are we. I am so pleased that Elizabeth is really getting into her rocks by way of Geology classes.

I just wish more of our young people would send me articles as their family has over time. Think about it. Diana Cohoon, Editor


